

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Introduction to Swahili Language

Swahili (also known as Kiswahili) is a language native to East Africa primarily Tanzania, Kenya and the neighboring countries. There are different dialects of Swahili with noticeable differences in spelling, grammar and phonetics between the different regions. Historically Swahili was born out of a need for a common language between the native local languages of the Bantu along the coast of East Africa and pioneering traders from Arabia, Middle East and some Portuguese, English as well as German. If you are familiar with Arabic then some Swahili words will sound very similar and have similar meaning. Presently it is estimated to be more than 100 million Swahili speakers in the world.

It is considered an easy language to learn and beautiful to speak and understand when spoken.

Pronunciation

Swahili pronunciation is fairly easy. You'll learn in this lesson how syllables are constructed in Swahili and how to pronounce them. We'll start our lesson with vowels – the most important building blocks of most Swahili syllables.

Vowels are called "vokali" in Swahili. They are, *a*, *e*, *i*, *o*, *u* - just as in English, but pronounced a little differently.

In every Swahili word the vowels make exactly the same sounds – no exception what-soever! It's important to note that Swahili is a phonetic language, which means each letter is pronounced consistently and there are no silent letters. Therefore, once you know the vowel sounds, you can pronounce any word in Swahili by sounding out each letter. Here is the breakdown of the pronunciations;



е	-	eh	like the e sound in yet	
i	-	ee	like the i syllable in idiot	
0	-	oh	like the o sound in go	
u	-	00	like the oo sound in good	


